A statue, or building erected to COMMEMORATE a famous or notable person or event

The CONFEDERACY 1861-1865

Definition: A rogue, Anti-Democratic, PRO-slavery, racist, repressive state

con-fed-er-a-cy (kan fed'or ə sē, -fed'ro sē), n., pl. -cies.
1. a union of persons, parties, states, etc., for some purpose; alliance. 2. a combination of persons for unlawful purposes; conspiracy. 3. the Confederacy. See Confederate States of America. [ME confederacie, alter. of LL confederatio CONFEDERATION; see -acy]

Confed'erate States' of Am' group of 11 Southern states that seceded from the U.S. in 1860-61. Also called the Confed'.

ROBERT E LEE statue in Dallas, TEXAS

c1936 Erected to Romanticize the Confederacy. Statue Sold in an Auction for 1.4 million. Lee was called "honorable, contradictory, devious, elusive, beautiful" (2017; Removed) Smithsonian Magazine

Robert E. LEE Austin, Texas Erected in the midst Jim Crow 2.9.1919 - 54 Yrs. After the CIVIL WAR

It was Removed in the middle the night "For public safety" in a swift operation.

2017. We do not chose our history, but we can chose who we honor.
